HELPING STUDENTS WITH ACADEMIC CREDIT RECOVERY

WHAT IS IT?

Credit recovery is designed to support students who may be struggling with missing key assignments or at risk of falling behind in their coursework.

HOW DOES IT WORK?

Intervention teachers work one-on-one with students, offering guidance and assistance in completing assignments, understanding difficult material, and improving their overall academic performance. This proactive approach allows students to address gaps in their learning, receive targeted help, and stay on track for success.

CLASS HIGHLIGHTS



OPPEDISANO'S SOCIAL STUDIES Grade 9 and 10

Everyday these students start class with 10 minutes learning about current events, global issues, a bit of trivia and always a feel-good story. This creates great classroom conversations and helps educate students about a wide variety of world events. Topics are based only on facts, with no biases.



PRZYBYLSKI'S CALM 20 CLASS PROJECT

Students explored various career options and learned about the financial implications associated with these choices. This research provided students insights into the required education, job outlook, and potential earnings. This project's goal was to help them make informed decisions about their future.



NORDHAGEN'S WELDING CLASS

This "Rocket Stove" project involved cutting 3-inch steel tubing at various lengths and angles to fabricate the stove. It was welded using the process of Gas Metal Arc Welding (MIG). This project required accurate measuring and placement of the metal to make it line up to produce the finished product."

CLUB HIGHLIGHTS



BOOK CLUB

The goal of this new, student-led club is to encourage reading beyond the school day. Members have voted to read books, like "Things Fall Apart" and "Fahrenheit 451." Students meet once a week to discuss their thoughts and opinions of their picks.



PEER TUTORING CLUB

Our Peer Tutor Club has tripled this year and is still growing! We have 21 volunteer peer tutors supporting 30 fellow students in various subjects. Students are spending 1-3 hours per week learning and supporting each other.



CRAFT CLUB

Students work on various projects including knitting, crocheting, painting, drawing and paper folding. They bring projects from home and also use materials here at the school. Ms. Emond can teach any students interested in learning how to knit or crochet, and students teach each other as well.
